As the state hospital forensic policy and legislative administrator, I am 20 responsible for legislative analysis and policy development and special programmatic aspects 21 of Washington State's Department of Social and Health Services State Psychiatric Hospital 22 System. I oversee state hospital policies and certain forensic programming for both adult and 23 I am a member of the State Hospitals and Behavioral Health children populations. 24 Administration leadership teams. With respect to forensic services, I am responsible for research and development related to delivery of effective client services; stakeholder 25 26

- communications; leadership development; workforce diversity and promoting cultural competency; and implementation of new initiatives.
- 2. I served as a private practice psychotherapist from 1990 1997, during which time I was a Licensed Mental Health Counselor in Washington State.
- 3. From 2009 to 2014, I worked in the Health Services Division at the Washington State Department of Corrections. I served as the DOC's Director of Behavioral Health, and was responsible for leading and managing a system of care that provides medically necessary mental health treatment to incarcerated individuals, and chemical dependency treatment services for both incarcerated persons and persons recently released from prison on community supervision.
- 4. As part of my duties here at DSHS, I play a central role in planning and implementing restoration programs in alternate facilities, including the Yakima County Competency Restoration Program (YCCRP). I assisted in planning for the program, including assisting with related legislative efforts during the 2015 legislative session. I assisted with the Department's Request for Information to solicit proposals for competency restoration services in alternate settings, and helped in the evaluation and selection of the successful submission. I have visited the Yakima facility several times, and have worked with the Central Washington Comprehensive Mental Health team to help coordinate their successful efforts to obtain Department of Health licensure, and Division of Behavioral and Health Recovery Certification as a Residential Treatment Facility (RTF). I have coordinated visits to the facility by a number of parties, including the Court Monitor, and I have helped with DSHS written responses to the Court Monitor following these visits. I have also facilitated the work of a clinical team that developed the admissions screening criteria for the new RTFs.
- 5. As someone who has managed correctional mental health services, I am familiar with the provision of mental health services in correctional facilities. The term "corrections-based restoration program" suggests that the program is provided within a correctional facility

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where the participants are intermixed with incarcerated individuals. In contrast, within the DSHS residential treatment facilities, patients will not be interfacing with inmates. While correctional facilities are responsible to provide medically necessary mental health services, such treatment is not the primary focus of the correctional facility. Within many jail settings, the scope of mental health services is limited, and may not include more than nominal engagement of patients in treatment activities.

- 6. In contrast, the YCCRP's central purpose is engaging patients in active mental health treatment. The Yakima restoration facility is licensed by the Department of Health and has met the state residential treatment facility standards. The facility is also certified by Division of Behavioral and Health Recovery as a residential treatment facility. Like the forensic wards at the state's adult psychiatric hospitals, YCCRP is a secure facility, charged with the responsibility of safely containing patients who are actively involved with the criminal justice system. However, the culture and function of the RTF is far from that of a correctional facility. The Department does not run any correctional based restoration programs.
- 7. There are fundamental distinctions between a correctional setting and the YCCRP. Within the culture of the correctional facility, inmates are subject to the correctional policies and procedures of the correctional facility, with the central goal of maintaining safety and security. In contrast, within YCCRP the policies and procedures are organized around the core goal of providing trauma informed, patient-centered mental health treatment. The staffing in a correctional setting typically is focused on security trained staff, with mental health staff in relatively short supply. In contrast, the RTFs are staffed as residential mental health facilities. In a correctional setting, the correctional officers who staff the jail report to a warden whose primary concern is safety, security, and order. At YCCRP, the staff report to a clinical manager, whose primary concern is a safe, therapeutic, and effective competency restoration treatment program.

1	8. Attached as Attachment A is a true and correct copy of the YCCRP Procedural
2	Program Manual. This manual was developed to describe how Central Washington

5	duties, I helped in development and review of this document, and it was submitted to the

14	9. Attached as Attachment B is a true and correct copy of the YCCRP Restoration
15	Program Manual. This manual was developed in order to articulate the competency restoration
16	treatment philosophy and procedures used within this Residential Treatment Facility. As part
17	of my job duties, helped in development and review of this document, and it was submitted to
18	the Department per the terms of the contract. The Program Manual describes:
19	• Aims of the program;
20	<ul> <li>Competency standard and guidelines for best practices in competency restoration;</li> </ul>
21	<ul> <li>The Intake Psychological Assessment, and identification of specific individual Barriers to Competence;</li> </ul>
22	<ul> <li>Treatment modules to address individual barriers to competence;</li> </ul>

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25	10. Attached as Attachment C is a true and correct copy of the YCCRP
26	Competency Restoration-Functional Plan. This manual was developed to describe how the

1	program meets all requirements for Department of Health Licensure as a Residential Treatment
2	Facility. As part of my job duties, I helped in development and review of this document, and it
3	was submitted to the Department as part of YCCRP development and to the Department of
4	Health for licensure requirements. Accordingly, the Functional Plan describes:
5	Types of residents admitted;
6	<ul> <li>Services offered;</li> <li>Activities offered, including a sample day schedule of therapeutic activities;</li> </ul>
7	• Staffing;
8	<ul><li>Resident rooms;</li><li>Other rooms in the facility;</li></ul>
9	<ul> <li>How food, laundry, and medication storage are managed;</li> </ul>
10	<ul><li>How medications are administered;</li><li>Emergency Management procedures;</li></ul>
11	<ul><li>Security systems; and</li><li>Other components</li></ul>
12	11. Attached as Attachment D is a true and correct copy of the contract the
13	Department executed with Central Washington Comprehensive Mental Health. The contract
14	ensures that restoration services are provided in an effective manner that is consistent with the
15	restoration services provided within the state psychiatric hospitals. The contract also provides
16	for reporting and compliance monitoring of YCCRP by the Department.
17	12. The Yakima County Correctional Center was originally built to serve as a
18	minimum custody jail, and did function as such for approximately two years. During that
19	period, King County inmates were transported to the Yakima facility. However, King County
20	ceased using the Yakima facility and the facility has subsequently been empty. The
21	Department is now utilizing one wing within the facility, to be licensed and used as a
22	Residential Treatment Facility to provide competency restoration services.
23	13. Besides the wing currently occupied by the YCCRP, the remainder of the
24	building is vacant. However, the Department ensured that in the event that other parts of the
25	building became occupied, there would be no commingling with patients in the YCCRP. The
