I am over the age of eighteen, have personal knowledge of the matters stated 21 herein, and am competent to testify thereto. 22 2. I have been in corrections at the King County Correctional Facility (KCCF) for 23 thirty-four years. I have been the KCCF Facility Commander since June 2006. Prior to my 315 5th AVENUE SOUTH, SUITE 860 4

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current position, I was a Corrections Officer from 1980 to 1991, a Corrections Sergeant from 1991 to 1996, a Corrections Captain from 1996 to 2004, and a Corrections Major from 2004 to 2006.

- 3. As a corrections officer, I have had contact with offenders with mental illness since the first day on the job. Regrettably, we've always had acutely mental ill inmates in custody that lack competency to stand trial.
- 4. In past years, it appears that the wait time for Washington State Hospital (WSH) evaluations or restoration was significant, yet in the past year, the wait time has doubled.
- 5. Disability Rights Washington came to the King County jail in the fall of 2012 as part of an investigation related to a report called Lost and Forgotten.
- 6. Since 2004, and more so after DRW's Lost and Forgotten report, I became more and more aware of the acutely mentally ill in our custody and the negative effect that evaluation and restoration wait times have on their average length of stay, which has dramatically increased.
- 7. Generally speaking, those inmates that are mentally ill or facing competency issues can have a longer length of stay in jail than those without these issues.
- 8. Police officers on the street have limited viable resources to take these individuals as an alternative to jail. These programs may be better suited to serve the acutely mentally ill because they provide treatment for healthcare reasons rather than for forensic reasons which is what happens in the criminal justice system.
- 9. At the King County Correctional Facility, we provide for the health and safety of the inmates in our custody. This includes mental healthcare and special housing for the acutely mentally ill. However, the increasing length of stay of the acutely mentally ill in our facility significantly taxes the resources available to us.
